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
Fold all creases in both directions. Your wrapper

Use the bone folder to press the paper into crisp folds.

construction will be much easier this way.

## Folding the Wrapper

Cut lines



3 Affix a strip of dry adhesive along this edge (shown in blue) \*



again along the edge



An Important Tip:



With a fine-tipped bone folder crease the paper along these 4 lines, then fold the paper sections making sure the top and bottom edges are lined up.



~ A snap-off graphic knife (Olfa is a good brand)

Helpful Tools

- ~ A bone folder with a fine tip to crease the paper
- ~ A cork-backed ruler to guide the knife
- ~ A self-healing cutting mat

To fold the strip of paper into a box, begin by placing it face down



Then fold the paper as shown

When folding the paper make sure the top and bottom edges are lined up One last fold completes the wrapper



The adhesive is on the BACK SIDE

The back ... and here the front

The finished wrapper

will look like this:



🔻 Grafix Double Tack Mounting Film works well for me. Other "dry" adhesives, such as double stick tape, should work as well. It is best to test this out.
